Agilbys Colmundo was left about 9 leagues south of Independencia. A. Galindo and pangare ajino about 2 leagues east of Santiaguena's puesto near Alerta. 2 of Donkins lost ~~these~~ leagues west of Hernan Cortez. Axford said Robson oscura and Donkins alazan at mustatar, and Agilbys rasillo
