PASSPORTS.

A British Subject travelling on the Continent should carry a Passport, as it is at all times proof of identity. A Passport is necessary for Austria, Egypt, Greece, Portugal, Russia and Turkey. Travellers intending to visit Russia are advised to have their passports visé before starting. Passports are issued to British-born subjects by the various British Consuls abroad on personal application, or at the Foreign Office in London at a charge of 2s. for one or any number of persons, on presentation of a recommendation from a Banker under seal. Application must be made by letter addressed "Chief Clerk, Foreign Office, London" and marked "Passport." It will be issued on the following day, between 11 and 4. It should be signed by the bearer as soon as it is received, as without such signature its validity may be questioned abroad. Passports are issued to naturalised British subjects only on personal application at the Foreign Office. The cost of stamp for passport is 6d. Persons entering Germany from France must be provided with passports.

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING A WILL.

A Will cannot be made in language too simple or concise; must be written with Ink on Paper or Parchment, and signed at the end by the Testator, in the presence of two or more Witnesses, who must not be parties interested in the Will; or if written on more than one sheet, the Testator and the Witnesses should sign each sheet. The Witnesses must rigidly comply with every particular required by the Attestation Clause, at the end of which clause they must sign their names. The signature of the Testator must be acknowledged by him, in the presence of the Witnesses, and he should (after signing) take the Will in his hand, and say, "I acknowledge this to be my last Will and Testament, and request you to witness it."

FORM OF WILL.

This is the last Will and Testament of me of
I hereby revoke all wills by me at any time heretofore made. I appoint to be my Executor and direct that all my just debts and funeral and testamentary expenses shall be paid as soon as conveniently may be after my decease.

ATTESTATION CLAUSE.

Marriage after making a Will renders the Will void.

A Witness need not know the contents of a Will, which may be folded so that the Signature and Attestation Clause alone can be seen.

A person who has been left a legacy in the Will, or whose wife or husband has been left a legacy, should not be an Attesting Witness. Their attestation would be good, but they would forfeit the legacy.

Every Will should be entered at the Probate Registry of the District. The London (and principal) Registry is at Somerset House, where an official copy of any Will may be read on payment of 1s., or copies obtained on payment of a fixed scale of charges.

8. POSTAL AND MONEY ORDERS.

Postal Orders are issued at all Money Order Offices for sums of 1s. and 1s. 6d. at commission of 1/4d.; for 2s., 2s. 6d., 3s., 3s. 6d., 4s., 4s. 6d., 5s., 7s. 6d., 10s., and 10s. 6d., at commission of 1d.; and for 15s. and 20s. at commission of 1 1/4d. The name of the person to whom the amount is to be paid, must be written on the Order, and the name of office at which it is to be paid, may be filled in. If it is desired to be paid only through a banker, it should be crossed with name of such banker.

Money Orders are granted and paid in the United Kingdom at commissions as under:—For sums under £1, 2d.; above £1, and not exceeding £2, 3d.; above £2, and not exceeding £4, 4d.; above £4, and not exceeding £7, 5d.; above £7, and not exceeding £10 (highest amount granted), 6d.

Foreign Money Orders are issued to most countries:—For sums not exceeding £2, 6d.; £5, 1s.; £7, 1s. 6d.; and £10, 2s.

9. POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK, &c.

Deposits.—Deposits are received of not less than 1s. at one time or more than £30 in any year ending 31st December, or £150 in all, of any one person: The interest is £2 10s. per cent. per annum. The interest due to each depositor is added to the principal due to him on the 31st December in each year.

Insurances and Annuities.—Insurances are granted by the Post Office on lives of persons between the ages of 14 and 65, for sums from £5 to £100; and Annuities, Immediate or Deferred, are also granted of not more than £100 on the lives of persons aged 5 years and upwards.

Investments in Government Stocks can be made by a depositor in the Post Office Savings' Bank in sums of not less than £10.

POSTAL TELEGRAM RATES.

The charge for any message of 12 words throughout the United Kingdom, including the Isle of Man and the Channel Isles, is Sixpence, and a halfpenny for each additional word. Names and addresses of receiver and sender are charged for. The cost of a reply may be prepaid, and should be, if immediate attention is required. The message may be written at the office and paid for at the time, or at home on a prepaid form and be enclosed in an envelope, addressed "Telegraph Office," and posted in the nearest letter box, in which latter case the message will be telegraphed to its destination as soon as the letter carrier takes it to the office.

LONDON POSTAL INFORMATION

Evening Mails.—At St. Martin's-le-Grand the letter boxes close at 6, but letters for inland circulation may be posted till 7.45 for 4d. extra. Those for places abroad, posted after 6 and up to 7 p.m., must be paid 1d. extra, till 7.15, 2d. extra, and up to 7.30 the additional charge is 3d. Newspapers and book packets are received—those for inland circulation to 5.30—and for places abroad until 6 p.m., or till 6.45 on payment of an additional 1/4d. till 7.15 on payment of 1/4d. At the Branch Offices in Lombard Street, Gracechurch Street, Mark Lane, Ludgate Circus, Charing Cross, and at the Chief District Offices letters are received until 6 p.m., or till 7 p.m. if bearing an extra 1/4d. stamp for inland, and 1d. for places abroad. The latest hour for the receipt of newspapers at these offices is 5.30 p.m.

Special Late Fee Boxes are placed at the railway stations, from which Mail Trains, having Travelling Post Offices, are despatched every evening, for letters for provinces and Continent of Europe. Letters thus posted for the continent must bear a 4d. stamp in addition to ordinary postage, those for provinces a 1/4d. stamp.

Morning Mails.—Letter boxes at Receiving Houses are open till 9 p.m. on previous evening for newspapers and letters; and at District Offices until 6 a.m. Letters can be posted at Pillar Boxes till 4 a.m. Letters for Ireland and Scotland posted at St. Martin's-le-Grand before 6.15 a.m., go by Morning Mails; or in late fee boxes at Euston Station, up to departure of respective Trains, for 1/4d. stamp in addition to postage.

POSTAL RATES, REGULATIONS, INFORMATION AND TABLES.

1. LETTERS.

Inland.—The Postage is, not exceeding 1oz., 1d.; not exceeding 2ozs., 1 1/2d., and for all greater weights 4d. additional for every 2ozs. No letter packet may exceed 18in. by 9in. by 6in.

Foreign.—The Rates of Postage will be found in Postal Tables Nos. 2 and 3. The dimensions allowed are 2 ft. by 1 ft. by 1 ft.

2. POST CARDS.

Inland.—Thin 7d., thick 8d. per dozen, or singly at 1/4d. each, either sort. Nothing whatever may appear on the front or stamped side but the address, nor may anything be attached to the front or back, under penalty of 1d. on delivery.

Foreign.—1d., 1 1/2d. and 2d. each, may be sent to all countries in the Postal Union; the rate varying according to destination.

Reply.—Reply Post Cards, for use in the United Kingdom, and to most countries in the Postal Union, are issued at double the cost of ordinary Post Cards.

3. NEWSPAPERS.

Inland.—Registered newspapers (i.e., those which, having paid a fee of 6s., have been registered at the General Post Office for transmission at the newspaper rate) may be sent to any part of the United Kingdom at a uniform rate of 1/4d. each, but a packet of several is not chargeable with higher postage than the book rate of 1/4d. for every 2 ozs. The packet must be made up without a cover, or in a cover open at ends, and so that the contents can easily be examined, be fully prepaid, and contain no writing but the address. No packet may exceed 1 1/2 lbs. in weight, 2 ft. in length, or 1 ft. in width or depth. Unregistered newspapers are subject to book post rates.

Foreign.—The Rates of Postage will be found in Postal Tables Nos. 2 and 3. Packets for countries in the Postal Union must not exceed 18 in. in length, or 1 ft. in width or depth. For other places, 2 ft. in length, or 1 ft. in width or depth.

Wrappers.—Wrappers for enclosing newspapers and book packets are issued, bearing stamps of the value of 1/4d. and 1d., and are sold in bundles of 7 halfpenny ones for 4d., and 8 penny ones at 8d., or singly at 1/4d. and 1 1/2d. each.

4. BOOK PACKETS.

Inland.—No Book Packet may exceed 5 lbs. in weight, 1 ft. 6in. in length, 9 in. wide, and 6 in. in depth. The ends must be left open, and they must be prepaid in stamps at the rate of 1/4d. for every 2 oz. or fraction of same. If insufficiently prepaid, they will be charged with double the deficiency, but any packet which bears no postage stamps will be charged double postage.

Foreign.—The regulations as to packets for places abroad are in most cases the same as for Inland Packets. The limits of weight and size are the same as for newspapers for countries in the Postal Union. For rates of postage see Postal Tables, Nos. 2 and 3.

5. SAMPLE & PATTERN POST.

Inland.—This is confined to bona-fide patterns and samples of merchandise. Rates: under 4 oz. 1d., from 4 oz. to 6 oz. 1 1/2d.; from 6 oz. to 8 oz. (maximum) 2d.

Foreign.—The limit of weight is not the same to all countries. See Postal Tables Nos. 2 and 3.

6. PARCEL POST.

Inland.—The rate of postage (to be prepaid in ordinary postage stamps) is 3d. for a parcel not exceeding 1lb.; and 1 1/4d. for every additional lb. up to 11lbs., which is the maximum allowed. The dimensions allowed for an Inland Postal Parcel are:—maximum length, 3 ft. 6 in.; maximum length and girth combined, 6ft. Examples.—A parcel measuring 3 ft. 6 in. in its longest dimension may measure as much as 2 ft. 6 in. in girth, i.e., round its thickest part; or a shorter parcel may be thicker—e.g., if measuring no more than 3 ft. in length, it may measure as much as 3 ft. in girth, i.e., around its thickest part.

Foreign and Colonial.—Parcels can now be sent to most Countries. The rates of postage, weight and size differ for different Countries, and inquiry should in all cases be made at a Receiving House, or particulars ascertained from the Post Office Guides, sold at any Post Office at 1d. and 6d.
